"We are called to be people of hope. We are called to be ambassadors of hope in our families, in our neighborhoods, in our communities. The hope is that all is not lost, all is not divided, and Jesus is still king - heaven is still open and God is not dead."

These were some of my words during my sermon on the Feast Day of St. Michael and All Angels.

I am currently reading a book about leadership in modern Prime Ministers and the lessons we can learn. What has been strikingly obvious is that as technology has advanced, politicians have faced increased scrutiny from the media.

We live in a world where we are inundated with news reports and advertising, all shaped to get our attention and to keep us looking. Sadly, it appears that the most successful news is the bad, the critical and the controversial news.

It's no wonder so many people live in fear and with a state of depression, and have become afraid to be themselves and for some even to leave the house.

In the letter of 1 John it states:

"There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love." (1 John 4:17)

If perfect love casts out fear—it is hatred, bitterness and unforgiveness that cause fear. All over the media, whether print or online, you can see these themes at work, causing divisions in families, neighbourhoods and wider communities.

1 John goes to say this:

"And he has given us this command: Anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister." (1 John 4:21)

We can be ambassadors of hope through simply sharing a message of love through our relationships with others.

That means stopping to say hello to our neighbours. It means when we disagree, choosing conversation over walking away or shouting. It means seeking out those we have offended or those who have offended us and choosing to forgive

and making amends—even if that means using the difficult word sorry.

Love is not about looking past wrong, and it is not about pretending we didn't see the evil and injustice. Love is about choosing to be better, and choosing to overpower those actions with actions of love and charity.

That comes down ultimately to how we see each other. Where we have opinions of us and them, where we choose to observe the divisions as opposed to looking at those things we have in common, we have to change.

The kingdom of heaven is not about division, it's not about us and them, but it is about good overcoming evil, light banishing dark, justice supplanting injustice.

If we can model it in our every day relationships, in our neighbourhoods and within this community, surely there is still hope for our politicians too.

FUNDRAISING NEWS

When we made a first visit to Newala in 2010, we learnt that St Michael's Mtwara, the strongest congregation in the Diocese, raised funds in ways very like our own in Bramhall. Three times a year - Easter, Christmas, and Michaelmas - they would hold an auction of gifts from congregation members; some families could only contribute a single egg to auction. Other congregation members, say with government jobs or in business would pay large sums for that same egg as well as making more expensive. Georgie for organizing a superb evening. gifts. Each auction might make as much as £200, a lot of money in Tanzania.

Back home in Autumn 2010, members of our Mothers Union agreed to organise cake sales three times a year in emulation of our Fellow Christians in Néwala in the hope of raising about £600 annually. While we haven't usually quite made £600 each
